A new executive director and MPA's 150th mark significant milestones

he June MPA-MPS board meeting generated big news: Directors named Mark Maassen as successor to Doug Crews as executive director upon Doug's retirement in February 2016. As director emeritus Dave Berry noted, there have been two MPA directors during his lifetime — Doug and Bill Bray. Mark's appointment is truly a momentous event.

The decision followed a rigorous process that started late last year and involved considerable time and effort by some folks who deserve recognition. Joining me on the search committee were Dennis Warden, Dave Berry, Dane Vernon, Vicki Russell and Jim Sterling. Richard Gard and Bill Miller Jr. dropped off the committee during the course of the search, but not before each contributed valuable service.

rom a pool of about 50 applicants, the committee narrowed the field to 10 who were interviewed by telephone. By the end of April, four had been chosen for face-to-face follow-ups. Two finalists were presented to the board June 12 and Mark emerged as the successful candidate.

I have a feeling we won't be disappointed. Mark brings an entrepreneurial spirit from his many years at *The Kansas City Star*. His experience developing new revenue streams will be invaluable to the association, and he has a genuine enthusiasm for the important place of newspapers in Missouri communities. Starting in early September, he will work with

Maassen selected MPA executive director

Mark Maassen was selected by the Missouri Press Association's board of directors Friday, June 12 to become the association's executive director, succeeding Doug Crews, who is retiring March 2016. Maassen will officially start Sept. 1 and work with Crews and the staff at MPA during a transition period.

A search committee narrowed a pool of about 50 applicants to 10 before two finalists were presented to the board and Maassen was approved.

"Mark is a great choice to lead the association through a time of change," MPA president Jim Robertson said. "His long and diverse experience in print and digital media stood out among the candidates, and his enthusiasm for Missouri newspapers is unmatched."

Maassen has served on the board of directors of the Missouri Press Association and was president in 2013.

He spent more than 30 years at *The Kansas City Star* where he recently served as director of classified, major and national advertising with an annual revenue of \$64 million. He has been a group publisher of four weekly newspapers (*Lee's Summit Journal*,

Cass County Democrat Missourian, Belton Star Herald, and Olathe News) and has a proven sales and leadership record in the newspaper advertising industry.

As executive director, Maassen hopes to convey his love of newspapers. "My family grew up as a newspaper-reading household, with subscriptions to two daily newspapers and one weekly. My thought processes have been formed by reading newspapers. It is part of my DNA," Maassen said. "I consider it an honor and a privilege to serve as executive director of the Missouri Press Association. I have a passion for this industry."

Maassen earned a bachelor's degree in journalism from the University of Missouri in Columbia with a major in advertising and emphasis in public relations.

He is president of the Missourian Publishing Association, with oversight of the *Columbia Missourian*.

He serves on the Mizzou Advantage, Media of the Future Advisory Board at Mizzou and helped organize American Newspapers Digital Access Corporation (ANDAC), a multi-state effort to digitize and protect content.



His interests include St. Peter's Church, Pop Warner football, golf, skiing and being outdoors.

A more in-depth feature about Maassen, his strategy for MPA and his personal narrative is planned in an upcoming edition of *Missouri Press News*.




Interactive guide helps boost online readership

St. Louis

Martin Duggan

Martin Duggan, 93, of St. Louis died May 27, 2015 at St. Agnes Home in

Kirkwood of cardiovascular disease. He grew up in south St. Louis, the son of a union pressman and a homemaker. He started at the St. Louis Globe-Democrat in 1939, working summers in the features depart-



ment. During World War II, he edited war stories for the Marines. After the war, he returned to the *Globe*. He was a copy editor, slot-man in charge of

the copy desk, news editor, associate managing editor and, in 1973, editor of the editorial page. When the *Globe-Democrat* was sold in 1984, he lost his job at age 62. Three years later, he was one of the best-known people in St. Louis, with his own television show, "Donnybrook." The show won two Emmys under his 23-year stewardship. In addition to his wife of 73 years, survivors include three sons and a daughter.

Marshfield

Jack Watters

Jack Watters, 89, of Marshfield, died May 27, 2015. A lifelong resident of Marshfield, he served the community as reporter, editor and publisher of *The Marshfield Mail* from 1951 to

1989. Jack's father, T. Ballard Watters, was the editor and publisher of *The*

Mail, having taken over from his father, Theron H. Watters, one of the newspaper's early owners. While growing up, Jack worked as a printer's devil at the weekly newspaper and went on to work in all



phases of the newspaper operation. He served in the U.S. Army in World War II and then attended the University of Missouri at Columbia, earning a bachelor's degree in journalism in 1951. He was president of the Ozark Press Association and was inducted into the Missouri Press Association Newspaper Hall of Fame in 2004. He is survived by his wife of 64 years, Etta Jean; two sons, a daughter and six grandchildren.

Ray Farris, Post-Dispatch president and publisher, said he would like to see the newspaper stay in the downtown area and is seeking a modern site.
- **St. Louis** -- Euclid Media Group of Cleveland, Ohio, announced it has purchased the *Riverfront Times* of St. Louis, an alternative weekly publication, from Voice Media Group. Sarah Fenske has been appointed editor-inchief.
- West Plains -- The West Plains Daily Quill has been purchased by Phillips Media, through the brokerage firm National Media Associates. Frank Martin III is the former owner/publisher.





To redact or not redact...

The conflict between state juvenile law and open records law

ne of the most-often asked questions on the hotline relates to law enforcement's release of the names of juveniles involved in various matters in towns. I can tell there are many local police departments who simply redact the name of a juvenile anytime they are involved in an incident, whatever the circumstances are that gave rise to that name being included.

I think that's the wrong interpretation of state law. However, there have not been a tremendous number of cases which have dealt with the conflict between the state juvenile law and the open records law.

As all of you know, the law regarding access to incident reports from law enforcement (section 610.100) states "All incident reports and arrest reports shall be open records."

The only redaction of names from an incident report that is permitted is that if it contains information "that is reasonably likely to pose a clear and present danger to the safety of any victim, witness, undercover officer, or other person; or jeopardize a criminal investigation, including records which would disclose the identity of a source... or a suspect not in custody..."

On the other hand, the statute that mandates closure of juvenile court records (Section 211.321) states at the beginning of subsection 1, "Records of juvenile court proceedings as well as all information obtained and social records prepared in the discharge of official duty for the court shall not be open to inspection or their contents disclosed, except by order of the court to persons having a legitimate interest therein..."

Does that mean all records involving juveniles can be closed? Not necessarily, I believe. First, I think it's important to note this statute relates only to juvenile court proceedings, and does not cover other sets of facts not involving a juvenile court proceeding, although it is often cited by law enforcement as a reason to close a record containing a juvenile's name.

There is only one case I can find that involves both the open records law and the juvenile statute. In that



case, the St. Louis Post-Dispatch sought access to a civil circuit court proceeding involving a child facing suspension from school who alleged he was handicapped. The court needed to consider that factor in regard to the school's allegations he brought a handgun to school. In this case, the court held the matters to be discussed in the courtroom so involved issues about which a strong personal privacy right attached that the paper

did not have a right of access sufficient to justify its presence in the courtroom for the proceeding.

That is understandable, but doesn't give us any guidance to use as authority for law enforcement to block out the name of a juvenile who was involved in an incident and for whom there seems to be no risk of a "clear and present danger" to their safety.

I also know of one attorney general opinion touching on the relationship between the two statutes. That opinion, Number 37-2003 (meaning it was issued in 2003), was in response to a letter to former Mayor Mike

Rich, of Warrensburg, who queried to then Attorney General Jay Nixon "how a municipality should treat requests for disclosure of arrest reports and incident reports which contain identifiable information about juveniles."

That request specifically noted "The reports may involve the juveniles as the offenders or as the victims in

abuse or neglect matters."

The AG opinion was specific that it limited its applicability "to records from juvenile court proceedings." So, it doesn't apply to any other situation. After detailing the language in Section 211.321, the opinion concluded, "the law enforcement agency must decide if the record itself is subject to disclosure." It also stated, "if the record is an open record, then all identifying information regarding juveniles must be redacted..."

I have a feeling many folks who look at this opinion and see that sentence, may forget that the Attorney General's opinion was limited "to records from juvenile court proceedings." It ONLY applies to records relating to juvenile court matters. It does NOT apply to all names of juveniles in all records of

law enforcement.

Nixon's office itself seems to get confused, because it further states that the kinds of identifying information regarding juveniles that should be redacted would be "addresses, phone numbers. cense plate numbers, physical descriptions, make and model of cars, names of family members, and other similar attributes."

Yes, that would be redactable if it is in a record about a juvenile court matter, but in that case the entire record would be closed because all juvenile court records are to be closed. It would, again, NOT close that information in any other kind

of a record that happened to contain a juvenile's name, assuming, again, there was no evidence of a "clear and present danger" to the juvenile as a victim.

There is absolutely no authority I'm aware of anywhere that would as a general rule close the name of a juvenile in every record of every public governmental body.
